Supplemental Information

Both campus programs, one through Impact Plus and one through DCBS, continue to be a success. We are proud to announce that our Equine Assisted Counseling (EAC) program is in full swing. It primarily focuses on the clinical needs of clients using horses to create metaphors for real life situations, insight into behaviors and expressions of feelings. The vocational aspect provides skills to prepare our residents for entry level positions in the equine industry or small animal clinics. The recreational portion provides opportunities to build self esteem and confidence as residents challenge themselves by performing various riding activities. A full time Equine Therapy Director, Mary Oldiges, LCSW, oversees the program. Program success is measured by a 42% decline in clinical concerns since its inception, as well as an overall increase in EAC Self Survey measures, including self esteem and problem solving. Finally, our state of the art indoor riding arena is complete and fully operational.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

The program will work with the DCBS worker and the family to begin family therapy sessions as soon as possible. Also, when appropriate and accessible, the program will attempt to provide transportation for residents to go on home visits, supervised or unsupervised, as set up through the residents worker and therapist. The program will also monitor both the resident (through individual therapy) and the family members involved (through the DCBS worker and family case plan) to make sure contact remains appropriate and progress is being made.

Special Interventions Available Internally

The residential therapists are on campus M-F during daily routine times. All staff are also trained in de-escalation techniques and SCM for crisis situations.

Description of how the program exceeds licensure ratios

No, the program does not exceed staff to client ratio requirements. The staff to client ratio is actually better than the requirement, with a 1:4 staff to client ratio during regular program hours.
