Group Effort of Kentucky is a residential treatment program in Bowling Green. We are a small program, providing service to only eight residents enables us to provide each resident with individualized treatment; maintaining a 1:4 ratio at all times. We serve adolescent males ages 12-18 yrs. We have single and double occupancy rooms available. We adapt our approach to the unique needs and goals of each resident, ensuring individualized treatment in a structured and therapeutic environment. Each resident is provided with one individual counseling session and three therapeutic group sessions each week. Group sessions focus on skill building (social, leadership, and independent living skills), A&D education, self-esteem, and anger management. Individual sessions focus on individual referral needs (i.e. inappropriate sexual behaviors, aggression, anger, grief and loss, A&D relapse prevention, sexual abuse (victim and perpetrator). Group Effort residents attend an on-site school through the Bowling City School District.
