All TLC clients and foster families receive 24/7, 365 days a year crisis on-call availability provided by master's level clinical staff. Additionally there is a toll-free phone number for out of county clients. The TLC program places heavy emphasis on matching clients to families for stability in placement, seeking to create "forever families", in accordance with the child's permanency plan - whether that be to return home or to become one of our many foster children who are adopted by their foster families. We offer an array of foster homes licensed for basic care, therapeutic care, and medically fragile care. All clients benefit from individual, family, and group therapy services provided on site by an in-house family therapist/clinical social worker; provision of these and all in-house clinical services will be guided by the comprehensive assessment and treatment plan. Please note: Because we are a therapeutic foster care program, our operational bed capacity and numbers of bedrooms are subject to change. Please call with questions concerning bed availability.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

Each client is assigned a Family Consultant and a Foster Family who, together, provide a variety of supportive services to birth families, including co-supervision of visitation with CHFS as required, transportation to and from visits with the natural family, including birth families in treatment planning and treatment team meetings (as deemed appropriate by CHFS), helping children develop Life Books that include photos and stories of birth families, and ongoing dialogue with children in family therapy sessions around issues related to their family of origin.

We are able to provide a complete continuum of care within the agency, from crisis stabilization and respite at our emergency shelter and residential program, to aftercare services for clients ages 18-24, and special services for pregnant and parenting teens. Access to state-of-the-art campus facility with planned therapeutic and recreational activities. In-home, school-based, and traditional outpatient individual, family, and group therapy services provided by an on-site family therapist/clinical social worker. Access to therapeutic support services for autistic children and referral to the Home's Kentucky Impact Plus services at the time of reunification or adoption. Access to 24/7 consultation and educational services by the medical and nursing staff of the Kosair Charities Pediatric Convalescent Center.
