## Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

We involve the bio family in the child's treatment process through requesting their input into the development of the treatment plan initially and on an ongoing basis. We send them notification of all treatment plan meetings and request their attendance; we make monthly contact to Bio families when permitted by State to keep them knowledgeable about their child in care. We support and often cover supervised visits for the state if needed or requested. We provide linkage and advocacy for local services within the bio family's home community for services we feel would benefit with the reunification and stabilize the family upon the child's return. We include bio families in our activities, if appropriate and approved by state, such as: Agency picnics, Christmas parties, annual youth and FP awards and recognition banquet, monthly trainings sessions, etc.

## Special Interventions Available Internally

We have an established 24/7 on-call crisis response intervention with clinical back up; staff are trained internally for crisis management interventions; All staff are required to be trained in verbal de-escalation training and PMAB-D; We have available to us through our 24/7 on-call for consultaton a registered nurse and a specialist in the field of MRDD.
