Crossroads Treatment Center is designed specifically for adolescent males whose primary service need is treatment for sexually acting out. CTC helps adolescent males take accountability for their behaviors, gain understanding of their choices, and develop a plan to remain safe in the community. In SFY 08, Crossroad's Treatment Center (CTC) attained an above average total score for their clinical services, including above average scores in the areas of Assessment and Service Delivery, in comparison to other private residential treatment programs as evaluated by the Children's Review Program. All administrative staff have a BA degree or higher. 35% of direct care staff has a BA or some college. CTC provides an on-campus school under the direction of the Hardin County School District. For youth that are not able to reunite with their family, Sunrise's continuum of care provides opportunity for youth to step down to less restrictive placement options that support relapse prevention and behavior management skills gained at CTC.

Family sessions are conducted and program staff work with the family to ensure that visits (both supervised and unsupervised) are successful. The program also works with the family regarding transportation issues.

Special Interventions Available Internally

Counseling staff are available 24/7 to assist youth in taking accountability for their behaviors, gaining understanding of their choices, and develop a plan to remain safe in the community. These goals are accomplished through a combination of relapse prevention treatment and training in the skills necessary to be responsible young men. Clients receive individual, group and family therapy. The Pathways treatment program is used in individual and group therapy to address sexual abuse and sexual offenses; this therapy is led by a JSOCCP certified therapist.
