The Sunrise Glendale center operates in a new, secure facility with an on campus school, full time nurse, case management and professional therapeutic support. The program uses a trauma recovery model focusing on the underlying attachment issues which contribute to most adolescent emotional and behavioral issues. Our staff are highly trained and work towards building supportive, trusting relationships which promote trauma recovery. Clients are assigned individual mentors who guide them towards improvements and social behaviors and a more healthy emotional balance. We incorporate family therapy, when possible, and provide a wide range of therapeutic groups, education and healthy recreational activities which encourage children to make positive attachments to our community. With Sunrise's continuum of care, we are able to provide comprehensive discharge planning including the option of Sunrise foster care. We are diligent in providing social workers with timely information on the progress of their clients and support services as needed. Our outcomes are consistently positive.

Family sessions are conducted and program staff work with the family to ensure that visits (both supervised and unsupervised) are successful. Families are invited to participate in treatment team meetings.

Special Interventions Available Internally

Therapeutic services include individual, group and family therapy; trauma recovery support; participation in a therapeutic community; independent life skills; substance abuse counseling; and psychiatric and medical services. The Seven Challenges program is used to assist youth, which come from a background that includes alcohol and substance abuse, to make a commitment to minimize the impact that drugs and alcohol has had in their lives. A variety of recreational, spiritual and cultural activities are offered within the program as well as off campus events throughout the community in which clients are encouraged to use their social skills to interact within the community setting.
