In SFY 08, Southern Region Foster Care Program scored above average in the areas of Treatment Planning and Service Delivery, when compared to other private foster care programs by the Children's Review Program. Since March of 08, Sunrise foster parents have adopted 103 DCBS foster children meaning 103 DCBS children have found a forever family through our Sunrise Foster Care program. The SRFC offers a professional staff consisting of a Program Director (MSW), Program Therapist (MSW/LCSW) and two Foster Care Specialists (Bachelor Degrees in Social Work). The program also has a Recruiter and Trainer who recruits families that have a desire to help abused and neglected children. Sunrise Children's Services provides all foster parents specialized de-escalation techniques from the Boy's Town training model. These techniques have proven effective for children of most ages and cognitive functioning levels as well as for children who display a variety of behavioral or mental health issues. Many of SRFC families have more than 10 years of fostering experience with our agency and have a wealth of knowledge and expertise in behavior management. SRFC staff are on call to support our foster parents at all times.

**Psychiatric Consultation and Internal Medical Staff**

Youth placed with SRFC with psychiatric needs are seen by a private physician rather than at the local mental health offices so their therapy needs can be met in-house by our credentialed therapist and thereby increasing therapeutic integration with the youth's treatment plan and foster family. A Sunrise nurse is available for consult. Community medical staff is utilized as needed.

Family sessions are encouraged and available. Program staff work with the family to ensure that visits (both supervised and unsupervised) are successful. The program also works with the family regarding transportation issues. Family members are invited, and encouraged to attend treatment plan conferences.

## Special Interventions Available Internally

Therapy needs of children placed with SRFC are coordinated and met internally to provide a more integrated service delivery system utilizing the foster parents to incorporate and support behavior modifications and therapeutic modalities within the home and the youth's daily life. SRFC staff are on call to support our foster parents at all times.

Description of how the program exceeds licensure ratios

SRFC regularly exceeds the minimum staff/client ratios. SRFC maintains the staff/therapeutic client caseload licensure requirement even though all children are not therapeutic.
